The City Council adopts the policy attached hereto as Exhibit "A" for naming of creeks and streams in Asheville.

Any other policy or process in conflict with the attached Policy is hereby repealed.

EXHIBIT "A"

CITY OF ASHEVILLE POLICY FOR THE NAMING OF CREEKS AND STREAMS

Purpose: The Asheville City Council (herein "Council") desire to have a fair and transparent process for naming of public property owned by the City and recognizes the need to also have a policy regarding the naming of creeks and streams or other natural features within the jurisdiction of the City of Asheville.

Applicability: This policy will be used for creeks and streams that are located within the City of Asheville's municipal boundaries. This policy may be used to name other natural features, if Council wishes to do so.

Policy:

- A. A community group or organization wishing to name a creek or stream in Asheville's jurisdictional boundaries shall use the USGS Domestic Geographic Name Proposal system.
- B. Before performing any official outreach activities, the community group shall contact the City of Asheville's Communication and Public Engagement Office to notify staff of their intent and to request a meeting to initiate the City's participation in the naming process.
- C. At that meeting, the group or organization will work with City staff to agree on a public engagement strategy (to solicit and gain input on potential names), and to identify the appropriate City advisory board that will advise Council on the community group's winning name. City staff person shall then forward the information to the appropriate City advisory board's staff liaison.
- D. The community group will execute the agreed upon engagement process prepared with City staff, and the City will support and leverage their efforts by using public engagement tools such as City website, blogs, and other City methods of providing public information.
- E. The community group will work with the staff liaison for the identified advisory board to request consideration of the preferred name, and to then request Council consideration to authorize the City Manager to sign the USGS Domestic Geographic Name Proposal System form.
- F. This policy is only a guide and nothing shall be construed so as to limit Council's authority to use its discretion to alter the process based on facts and circumstances surrounding the issue.

RESOLUTION TO AUTHORIZE CITY MANAGER TO SIGN UNITED STATES GEOLOGICAL SURVEY APPLICATION TO NAME CREEK IN WEST ASHEVILLE "PENLAND CREEK"

WHEREAS, the City of Asheville believes that a transparent, well-researched and community driven process was performed by RiverLink in efforts to name this creek; and

WHEREAS, The City of Asheville has received a recommendation from the Asheville Area Riverfront Redevelopment Commission to support "Penland Creek" as the name for this French Broad River tributary; and

WHEREAS, The City of Asheville recognizes that a local government official must sign the United States Geographic Survey (USGS) form in order for the community's efforts to be successful;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF ASHEVILLE NORTH CAROLINA THAT:

The City Council authorizes the City Manager to sign the USGS form certifying support for the naming of the creek in West Asheville that runs along Waynesville Avenue, through the New Belgium site, and into the French Broad River as "Penland Creek".

RESOLUTION NO. 14- 233

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO ENTER INTO A CONSTRUCTION AGREEMENT WITH COOPER CONSTRUCTION COMPANY, INC., FOR THE VAULT RENEWALS AND ZONE METERING PROJECT

WHEREAS, the City of Asheville has authority pursuant to Article 3 of Chapter 160A of the North Carolina General Statutes to enter into contracts for services with other entities; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to N.C.G.S. § 143-129, bids were solicited for the project known as the Vault Renewals and Zone Metering Project; and

WHEREAS, Cooper Construction Company, Inc., of Asheville, NC, was the lowest responsible, responsive bidder for the Project, in the amount of \$1,287,380, with the bid tabulation attached hereto as Exhibit "A"; and

WHEREAS, the project involves 40 job sites located at various locations within the City of Asheville's Water System and consists of the installation of zone meter vaults with SCADA improvements and appurtenances. Additionally, there are improvements to be constructed at multiple customer meter points of service throughout the water system. These improvements include vault improvements, vault replacements, meter installations and appurtenances; and

WHEREAS, the bids have been reviewed by the Water Resources Department, Cavanaugh and Associates PA, and the City's Office of Economic Development (Minority Business Plan Compliance) with all officers recommending approval of the bid;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ASHEVILLE THAT:

1. The Bid Tabulation attached hereto as Exhibit "A" be recorded in the minutes of the City Council as required by N.C. Gen. Stat. § 143-129.
2. City Council hereby authorizes a budget amendment to transfer funds from the Pump Station Meters Project to fund part of the construction contract and to combine two capital projects into one project.
3. The City Manager is hereby authorized to execute the contract with Cooper Construction Company, Inc., for the bid amount of \$1,287,380. City Council also grants approval of a contingency amount of \$128,738 for a total project budget in the amount of \$1,416,118 for the Vault Renewals and Zone Metering Project. The City Manager is further authorized to execute any change orders to said contract or documents which may arise during construction of said project up to the budgeted amount.

There is a maintenance crew of eight (8) employees dedicated to repair and exercise valves and conduct leak detection. The leak detection and valve exercising programs are run by mapping grid and conducted with advanced valve exercising and leak detection equipment. The equipment includes Wach's, Flow Metrix, DigiCorr, L-mic, and pod-type listening apparatus. Valves are also exercised as needed during water line breaks and other routine and scheduled maintenance. The Cross-Connection Program consists of two (2) Backflow and Cross-Connection Inspectors who audit the water system in accordance with the Water Resources Department's Cross-Connection Control Policy. Certified backflow testers and state-approved Operator Responsible In Charge cross-connection classes are held on an annual basis to ensure compliance with state and local regulations. The department partners with Land-of-Sky Regional Council's Waste Reduction Partners to conduct commercial water audits and to provide assistance to area schools interested in pursuing student water education program. Tours are also conducted at the main water treatment facility.





These projects are in the Master Plan to be completed in the future: (1) By 2012, 6 Pipeline Projects for \$4,740,000 and the Walnut Cove Pump Replacement for \$292,000, (2) By 2017, 4 Pipeline Projects for \$5,892,000 and a new Mills Gap Pump Station for \$1,556,000, and (3) By 2037, 4 Pipeline Projects for \$10,797,000 and Additional Water Treatment Capacity for \$37,172,000. Those estimates are in 2008 dollars, so the amount is expected to increase by approximately 3-4% each year until replaced. 


