Why is the City of Asheville doing an analysis?

In the Legislative Research Commission's Metropolitan Sewerage/Water System Committee's [report](#) to the 2012 Session of the General Assembly, Recommendation 2 of the report states,

The Committee recommends that the 2013 Session of the North Carolina General Assembly consolidate the Public Utility Water System with the Metropolitan Sewerage District of Buncombe County. Should the interested governments craft their own solution for consolidation, which achieves all the objectives of the Committee, before the 2013 North Carolina General Assembly convenes, due consideration would be given to the local plan. Action will not be taken if the parties are engaged in good-faith negotiations on this matter.

The City of Asheville and MSD are both engaged in analyses that will provide the basis for the good-faith negotiations related to the consolidation of the water and sewerage utilities. Information is being shared between stakeholders, all of which will be accessible through this site.

Brief chronological overview of the City of Asheville Water Utility and the assets associated with it.

May 4, 2011	House Bill 925 introduced to the State House “to provide for the conveyance of a city water system to a metropolitan sewerage district.” (HB 925).
May 5, 2011	House Bill 925 amended to “direct the Legislative Research Commission to study whether the efficiency of providing water and sewer services can be improved by requiring large cities located entirely within a metropolitan sewerage district to convey their water system to that district which can then operate both water and sewer” (Amended HB 925).

May 14, 2013	A 10-day Temporary Restraining Order (TRO) is granted in Wake County Superior Court to stay the effectiveness of HB 488 (now NC Session Law 2013-50), preventing any transfer of assets or functions of the water system to MSD, until the City can return to court and ask for a Preliminary Injunction to keep the transfer from occurring while the City's lawsuit is considered (Temporary Restraining Order , Complaint , Affidavit of Stephen Shoaf). A hearing on the motion for a Preliminary Injunction is scheduled for May 20, 2013.
May 17, 2013[?] (Exact Date Unknown)	The May 20, 2013, hearing on the motion for a Preliminary Injunction is extended to August 6, 2013, with stipulation by the parties. The TRO is further extended to September 6, 2013 to give Judge Manning time to prepare his written decision following the August 6, 2013.
June 5, 2013	House Bill 252, "Asheville Transfers", became law (HB 252 Session Law 2013-65).

As a condition of the Case Management Order, the City's notice of hearing on the motion for summary judgment (i.e., the City's request of the Court to make a judgment based on submitted information as opposed to a full trial) and the State's notice of hearing to dismiss the complaint (i.e., the State's request of the Court to drop the case) were both withdrawn but either party has the right to re-file. c. The temporary restraining order was extended until at least 30 days after the Court hears any and all motions that would end the lawsuit, or until the time the Court orders otherwise.
